RURAL LANDS UPDATE JAPANESE ENCEPHALITIS VIRUS **DETECTED IN PIGS IN QUEENSLAND**

Japanese Encephalitis Virus (JEV) has been detected at two piggeries in southern Queensland. There have also been recent detections in New South Wales and Victoria.

JEV is a zoonotic disease spread by mosquitoes that can cause reproductive issues in pigs and neurological signs in horses; such as lack of coordination, difficulty swallowing and impaired vision.

These are the first detections of JEV in animals in Queensland since July 2022. JEV is considered established in mainland Australia, so the detections are not unexpected.

Biosecurity Queensland is urging all horse owners to take preventative action to prevent the spread of JEV, monitor susceptible animals for any signs of disease and report any suspected cases to your local veterinarian.

In rare cases, JEV can cause disease in humans. Reducing exposure to infected mosquitoes is the key to avoiding JEV for yourself and your animals.

Advice for horse owners

The Australian mosquito (Culex Annulirostris) that transmits Japanese Encephalitis feeds at night and is reluctant to enter dwellings, so stabling horses between dusk and dawn is beneficial.

their horses avoid mosquito bites- put a rug and fly mask on and if the horse allows, apply a safe insect

repellent. Do not spray the

repellent around or above their eyes.

VARROA MITE IS ON QUEENSLAND'S DOORSTEP

Beekeepers in southern Queensland are urged to regularly check their hives as Varroa Mite draws closer to the Queensland border.

The pest, which affects honeybees, has been detected around Boggabilla, Legume, Drake and Byron-Lismore regions in northern New South Wales.

Early detection of Varroa Mite will help us slow the spread through Queensland.

Beekeepers should closely monitor their hives and immediately report unusual signs (like deformed

bees or dead brood) by calling 13 25 23. Development officers provide free support to recreational and commercial beekeepers and clubs.

COUNCIL'S SCALP BOUNTY PROGRAM (WILD DOGS)

Barcaldine Regional Council offers eligible applicants \$30.00 per scalp; male, female and pup scalps will receive the same payment rate.

Dingo scalps bounty claims are only accepted at the Barcaldine Regional Council Works Depot Monday -Thursday between 7am and 2pm. Scalps cannot be accepted at Council's customer services counter. All dingo scalps must adhere to the appropriate presentation and preparation guidelines along with

relevant paperwork (bounty book and invoice), failure to do so may result in refusal of claim. Scalps however will not be accepted during wet weather as council is unable to destroy them.




APPROPRIATE SCALP PRESENTATION AND PREPARATION

Horse owners can put other measures in place to help Dingo/wild dog scalps and skin pieces are to be provided to Council individually as described in the diagram below. The scalps should be:

- One whole single piece of skin and fur from the snout; including the ears, along the dingo/wild dog back to the tail.
- Air dried, frozen or fresh and preserved in a manner that allows for identification (i.e. flat).
- No frozen blocks of scalps or rotting scalps will be accepted.
- Scalps submitted in batches must be separated individually for identification and counting.

Council reserves the right to reject material submitted for the bounty if it does not meet the specified conditions.







ARE YOU BETTER THAN THE AVERAGE DRONE FLYER?

The Civil Aviation Safety Authority are pleased to announce the launch of their CASA annual summer drone safety campaign, Know Your Drone. As one of Australia's estimated 3 million recreational drone users, it's important you're aware of your responsibilities when it comes to flying safely. Take up the challenge by testing your knowledge of drone safety rules with our Know Your Drone quiz. More than 9,000 drone flyers have already taken the drone safety quiz, with the average drone flyer scoring 8 out of 11 rules correct. Are you up for the challenge? Scan the QR code above!

Stay safe with CASA-verified drone safety app

CASA-verified drone safety apps can help you stay a safe distance from airports, helicopter landing sites and restricted or danger areas. The apps use location-based maps to show where you can and can't fly your drone. Remember, you must also follow the drone safety rules at all times.

Drone safety tips for major events

With a busy calendar of major outdoor events over the summer, it's more important than ever to help keep everyone safe both on the ground and in the air. Following the drone safety rules is crucial.

Populous areas are off limits

Remember, you must not fly in populous areas like festivals, concerts or sporting events. Keep your distance, at least 30 metres from others and never fly above people. The airspace at these events can be busy, so ensure your drone doesn't pose a risk to other aircraft or property. Major event venues may be in restricted areas, So operating in these types of locations is unsafe and may lead to penalties. It's best to leave your drone at home during these events and staying grounded to enjoy the atmosphere.

Night flying rules apply

If you want to fly a drone at night, there are rules and requirements that apply to nighttime



flying. You will need a remotely piloted aircraft operator's certificate and a remote pilot licence. So, it's best to leave it to the professionals and hire a licensed and certified operator to capture those nighttime shots.

Commercial filming and photography

If you use a drone for commercial purposes, such as filming or photographing major events on behalf of a business or to generate income, you must have an operator accreditation certificate or a remote pilot licence (an operator on behalf of a business or individual who has a remotely piloted aircraft operator's certificate). These credentials mean you have the training and knowledge to fly safely in these environments. Remember, your drone must also be registered, regardless of the service you provide or its weight.

The new curbing helps to define the crossing area clearly, making it more visible for drivers and ensures cars cannot park in the marked areas. On Thursday, February 6, four members of the Aramac SES Group traveled to Townsville to assist with storm and flooding callouts as part of Task Force Delta. BARCALDINE SKATE PARK

Council seeks the co-operation from members of the Community wishing to use the skate park to ensure that the rules of use are adhered to:


